Preschoolers have big imaginations. Have fun as you teach your preschooler new skills and positive attitudes.

By the end	of 4 years, your child is able to:
	Say the sound of most letters with speech that is understandable.
	Understand 2,000 – 6,000 words. Speak 3-5 word phrases.
	Talk to others with feeling. Ask for what he wants. Tell stories.
	Use the words of, to, in, on, at and under
	Know the names and sounds of the letters in her name.
	Identify beginning sounds and same and different sounds.
	Eat without much help.
	Listen to others' stories and songs and join in conversations.
	Answer what and how questions in 3-to 4-words.
	Read his printed name and print the first letter of his name.
	Hop on one foot and walk heel-to-toe.
	Point to letters.
	Walk up and down steps without help.
	Sing learning songs. Recite 4 or 5 rhymes.
	Count to 20, and play counting games.
	Eat without help.
	Sort objects by color and shape. Count 1-7 objects.
	Trace a few letters, numbers and shapes.
	Match and name 10 shapes.
	Stack 8 or more blocks.
	Share and attend peer group activities, but still play alone.
	Follow a 2-step task.
	Help with simple tasks like washing his hands.
	Stay with a task for 3 minutes.
	Dress himself with little help. Undress himself without help.
